Ministry Centers

Send Relief ministry centers deliver compassion ministry within local communities while providing mission trips and training opportunities for churches all over the country. The goal of ministry centers is twofold: serve communities well and encourage others to do the same.

All over North America, Send Relief ministry centers actively assess community needs, develop ministry strategies, deliver ministry and provide opportunities for others to go on mission.



As an unincorporated territory of the United States, Puerto Rico's official languages are Spanish and English. A bicultural territory, people often speak a mixture of both, "Spanglish," given the influence of the U.S. on the island.

- The aftermath of Hurricane Maria in September 2017 placed 12,000 people in shelters all across Puerto Rico.
- After the earthquake in early 2020, 5,000 **residents** remained in homeless shelters even after Puerto Rico restored power.
- After Hurricane Maria (2017) there were 950 earthquakes and aftershocks throughout the area. This has caused even more issues for those already going through hardships. Moreover, these aftershocks caused 10,000 people to evacuate from their homes and seek shelter.
- American Bar reports that the Puerto Rican housing market has faced a prolonged crisis since the 2006 economic crisis that depreciated values within the market; the island lost around 45,880 households due to increased migration to the mainland.

- About 48% of Puerto Rico's population live under the poverty line with an income of less than \$19,000 per year per household.
- Economic growth fell by 10% between 2004 and 2018, with an unemployment rate above 8% and a declining population compounding this deficiency.
- As of January 2020, Puerto Rico had an estimated 2,451 people experiencing homelessness on any given day.
- In 2014, the U.S. Census estimated that 58% of Puerto Rico's children live below the federal poverty level — much higher than the overall rate of 22% of children living below the poverty line throughout the United States.

- The U.S. Department of Education during the 2018-2019 school year showed that an estimated 4,717 public school students in Puerto Rico experienced homelessness over the course of the year.
- FEMA's Temporary Sheltering Assistance program also reported that it housed **more** than 7,000 families in over 1,000 hotels in 41 states, Washington, D.C. and Puerto Rico.

Puerto Rico Ministry Center Guaynabo Partnerships

The Puerto Rico Send Relief Ministry Center provides meal distribution, construction projects. Volunteers help rebuild and repair residual storm damage as well as damage from recent earthquakes.

- Send Relief's Puerto Rico Ministry Center exists to minister and care for people in need.
- The local churches identify tangible needs in their community that will allow them to help rebuild and provide encouragement and meet spiritual needs.
- They have replaced metal roofs, sealed concrete roofs, replaced windows, doors and other light construction projects for the elderly.
- Send Relief continues to infuse energy and resources into church planting efforts and enhance its compassion ministry work.

Jonathan Santiago, Puerto Rico's Ministry Center director, said, "The facility creates a permanent

presence in Puerto Rico. It's not iust for relief efforts but community engagement on behalf of Southern Baptists. We run logistics from a centralized location, which will help facilitate ministry on the island."

- Families are learning to cope with other stressful factors.
- Low-income neighborhoods have vulnerable communities with many socioeconomic needs and increased crime.

"We are always being stretched," Jonathan explains. "Circumstances and realities of those we serve help keep us depending on God. We cannot do this work on our own and our desire to help is not enough; we need the Holy Spirit to lead us."

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History of the Puerto Rico Ministry Center

The Puerto Rico Ministry Center was established when Send Relief responded to the destruction caused by Hurricane Maria in September 2017, a Category 4 storm that—according to the Federal Emergency Management Agency – set the island's infrastructure back eight years.

In the aftermath of the hurricane. Send Relief sent volunteers to help homeowners rebuild. The Ministry Center expands Send Relief's ability to serve and equip mission teams who travel to the island to meet needs and change lives by serving communities in Jesus' name.

"Puerto Rico has a very religious culture with a strong Catholic background," Jonathan says. "Most everyone claims to know about God, making it difficult to share the gospel because most people believe that they are already Christians."

Their main challenge is the need to re-evangelize communities. The last two or three generations have not experienced the teaching of sound doctrine and as a result, the church is marked by an impoverished Christian practice.

The Puerto Rico Ministry Center partners with local churches and church plants to find ministry opportunities and identify needs. They also partner with nonprofits; federal, local and state government; emergency management offices and churches both local and long distance. They hope a new generation of pastors and leaders will embrace partnering with the local church for good resources and a genuine revival!

"Pray that God will give growth and fruit to this labor," says Jonathan.
