Ministry Centers

Community Snapshot

Chicago Ministry Center | Chicago West Bible Church

Chicago has all the offerings of a major city: world-class museums, delicious cuisine, vibrant shopping districts and more.

For five years in a row, Chicago was voted the best big city to visit. Architects built Chicago around a park system, and it is home to 570 parks.

Its most prominent park is Lincoln Park, which is 1,000 acres larger than Central Park in New York City.

Chicago is community-driven. It has 77 distinct neighborhoods that function like small cities.

Like most big cities, it showcases the extremes of wealth alongside extreme poverty, poor education and illiteracy.

The Chicago Ministry Center focuses its efforts in low-income, underserved areas of the city, suburbs and neighborhoods.

The goal is to strategically work in unreached and underserved neighborhoods so they can meet needs, share the gospel, and see communities transformed.

The location of the Center is in the Austin neighborhood, the largest in the city with about 100,000 people.

Austin is the last area before leaving the west side of Chicago, making it a prime location for gang violence, drugs and chronic disparity in police response for protection, especially in the multi-diverse areas of the community.

According to a 2016 analysis by the Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning, **99,711** people and **32,277 households** resided in the area.

- The racial makeup of the area was **4.20%** White, **84.20%** African American, **0.50%** Asian, **0.80%** from other races.
- Hispanic or Latinx of any race were **10.30%** of the population.
- In 2019, Chicago had a population of **2.69M** people with a median age of **35**.
- The five largest ethnic groups in Chicago are White (Non-Hispanic) (33.5%), Black or African American (Non-Hispanic) (28.5%), White (Hispanic) (17.3%), Other (Hispanic) (9.36%), and Asian (6.86%).

- **35.4%** of the households in Chicago speak a non-English language at home as their primary language.

- **89.7%** of the residents in Chicago are U.S. citizens.

In 2019, the median property value in Chicago was **\$275,200**, and the homeownership rate was **44.2%**. Most people in Chicago, IL, drove alone to work, and the average commute time was 33.1 minutes.

- The average car ownership in Chicago, IL, was one car per household.
- The most common foreign languages spoken in Chicago are Spanish (596,765 speakers), Chinese (53,111 speakers) and Polish (39,758 speakers).
- In 2019, the most common birthplace for the foreign-born residents of Illinois was Mexico, the natal country of **599,327** Illinois residents, followed by India with **156,360** and Poland with **120,839**.

Chicago Ministry Center Partnerships

From establishing church-based ministry to partnering with those already on mission in Chicago, the Chicago Ministry Center hopes they can make a difference.

- Currently, the ministry center is partnering with Moody Theological Seminary's counseling department to use the Ministry Center to house free and discounted counseling for residents of Austin and the Westside.
- They are also collaborating with local church planters and pastors to use the Ministry Center as a hub for mutual missional partnerships throughout the city.
- With a collaboration with Chicago Westside Sports, a faith-based sports league, they employ Chicago police officers to coach sports teams in the area. They allow other churches to serve as sponsors and various donors.
- The ministry center also collaborates with several non-profits throughout the city such as By the Hand Club for Kids, GRIP Outreach for Youth, World Relief, Together Chicago and Chicagoland Association. The ministry center collaborates with these non-profits to provide mentoring, training and community resources to vulnerable populations.

History of the Chicago Ministry Center

In a building originally built in 1906, located on the westside of Chicago, the Chicago Ministry Center serves as a hub for training and missional opportunities.

In the 1960s, an influential African American Baptist church purchased the building, and over the past several years, the leaders of this church felt the calling to move to the suburbs. And while God was moving the leaders of that church to move out, He was raising a congregation to move in.

Since 2016, Chicago West Bible Church has shed light on the west side of Chicago, bringing the hope of the gospel through

tangibly loving and serving the community. In the beginning stages, they prayed for a building and waited on the Lord to provide. He did.

In the spring and summer of 2020, the pastors of Chicago West and Send Relief met. From these meetings, a big dream to start a Send Relief ministry center on the westside of Chicago grew into a reality. In God's kindness, the previous occupants of the church building agreed. In March 2021, Send Relief purchased this historic building, allowing Chicago West Bible Church to move in and partner in the formation of the Chicago Send Relief Ministry Center.

"We are focusing our efforts here in three areas: the city of Chicago, the suburbs and in neighborhoods with predominantly non-English speakers," Jason Stuckey, ministry center coordinator, says. "The hope is to see local churches engage in unreached and underserved neighborhoods so they can meet needs, share the good news, develop leaders and see communities transformed."

Jason believes change is possible, but it will require dedicated, passionate people who want to invest in others and make a difference in their communities





Vision

The Chicago Ministry Center's vision for the future is to continue doing the work that God has already started and find creative ways to reach out to the community.

“My dream is to see the ministry center become a resource hub in which local pastors and church planters can connect, collaborate and receive training and support resources that will aid them in more effectively serving their communities,” Jason Stuckey explains. “Furthermore, my dream is to see The Chicago Ministry as a training center and launching pad for mission teams that will come to serve but leave equipped with a clear vision for how to serve their communities at home.”
